


Now that you've explored the exhibits, what do you think is missing?



In the United States, once the 19th Amendment
was passed by Congress, it had to be ratified by
75% of the states. In 1920, there were 48 states.
How many states needed to ratify the amend-
ment for it to become part of the U.S.
Constitution?

As each state ratified the amendment, members of the National Women's Party sewed a star on a purple, white, and gold banner.
