The current exhibitions in the Museum are:

Aquí Estamos: New Selections from the Permanent Collection showcases



the breadth of the permanent collection. As always, the artworks featured in Aquí Estamos are global in scope and reflect the complexity of the Hispanic experience demonstrating that there is no one way to create art that exemplifies what it means to be Hispanic, Chicana/o, Latinx, and/or Latin American.

<u>El Perú: Art in the Contemporary Past</u> aims to break down stereotypes of what visitors expect to see in a "Peruvian art exhibit." The exhibit celebrates the work of four Peruvian artists and explores the Peruvian pre-colonial and colonial past while addressing race, class and inclusion in the contemporary present. Works include photography, sculpture, ceramics, painting, and multimedia in juxtaposition with examples of their historical antecedents.

<u>Southwest of Eden: The Art of Adam and Eve</u> features approximately fifty works of art from the Joyce Kaser Collection. Situated in the NHCC Art Museum's highly popular community gallery, Southwest of Eden invites the visitor to take a closer look at the imagery, symbolism, and story of what happened in the garden.

The Bosque Gallery at the National Hispanic Cultural Center

The new Bosque Gallery at the National Hispanic Cultural Center is a beautiful openair gallery space that runs along the Bosque Trail to the east of the Rio Grande just south of César Chávez and Dolores Huerta Avenues. It will be an exhibition space roughly 2 ½ times the length of a football field. Bosque Gallery exhibitions will be mounted on the exterior wire fencing owned by the NHCC. Exhibitions will rotate between the key program areas, and will include topics supporting the NHCC's mission including History, Literary Arts,



Visual Arts, and Performing Arts. The Bosque Gallery exhibits will be accessible, bilingual, and inclusive. The Bosque Trail is highly trafficked with cyclists, joggers, and walkers. This will allow free access to valuable cultural content to families and individuals of all ages and backgrounds.

The first exhibit in the Bosque Gallery Series will be:

¡MIRA! NUESTRA ARQUITECTURA: An Architectural Journey

To commemorate the 20th anniversary of the National Hispanic Cultural Center, the History and Literary Arts program presents *¡Mira! Nuestra Arquitectura: An Architectural Journey*, an architectural history of the Center's past, present and future. This exhibit consists of text, sketch drawings,



blueprints, maps, and photographs exploring Hispanic/Latinx culture and heritage as expressed through the buildings and landscape of the Center. The exhibit shows the original design concept for the Center's campus, the subsequent redesign, as well as the challenges and triumphs in building this prominent institution whose doors opened in 2000.

Instituto Cervantes Albuquerque presents LGTBI+ en línea, an online showcase of short subjects, both feature films and documentaries, by Spanish, Colombian, and Mexican filmmakers showcasing the individuality and creativity demonstrated in the exploration of



distinct sexual identities. It is presented in collaboration with the National Hispanic Cultural Center as part of the Bank of America Free Film Series.

On October 9, Andrew Houchens' short documentary *Juan de las Brujas* honors the fulfilling life and enduring legacy of Juan Medellín, a founding member of the renowned Ballet Folklórico de Amalia Hernández who remained with the company for nearly 40 years. The film uses colorful, hand-drawn animation to illustrate Medellín's childhood memories, his start as a dancer, and his time with the ballet during its "golden age." It has been described as a "humble love letter to Mexico." 2019; Spanish with English subtitles; 18 minutes; not rated.

On October 13 in Pablo Guerrero's short feature film *Princesa de hielo*, a young boy's parents read the letter that he has written to Los Reyes Magos on the eve of Three Kings' Day. 
Selena at Balloon Park Drive-In

As part of this year's celebration of Hispanic Heritage Month, the NHCC and the Balloon Park Drive-In have been screening a series of four films highlighting Hispanic history, culture, and contributions. The final screening will be *Selena* in the RV parking lot of the International Balloon Museum at Albuquerque's Balloon Fiesta Park.

Selena Quintanilla, a major figure in Tejano music, a Grammy-

winning recording artist, and a beloved star in the Southwest U.S. and Mexico, was poised to cross over into mainstream popularity when she was murdered in 1995 by the president of her fan club. Gregory Nava's biographical drama stars Jennifer Lopez in the breakthrough role of her career, and also features Edward James Olmos as Selena's father, Abraham Quintanilla, Jr. 1997; 127 minutes; rated PG.





Presented by Bookworks, the National Hispanic Cultural Center, and the University of New Mexico Press. In *Feel Puma*, Ray Gonzalez traces his love of reading, philosophy, and learning with poems constantly in conversation—with each other, with texts by other writers and the writers themselves, with world history and his personal history and people he has encountered.

Ray Gonzalez is the author of fifteen books of poetry, including *The Heat of Arrivals* (1997), winner of the PEN/Oakland Josephine Miles Book Award; *Cabato Sentora* (2000), a Minnesota Book Award Finalist; *The Hawk Temple at Tierra Grande* (2003), winner of the 2003 Minnesota Book Award;



Consideration of the Guitar: New & Selected Poems (2005); Cool Auditor: Prose Poems (2009); and Beautiful Wall (2015). Gonzalez is also the author of three collections of essays, two collections of short stories, and the editor of twelve anthologies. He has served as the poetry editor for the Bloomsbury Review for thirty-five years and in 1998, founded the poetry journal LUNA. Gonzales is a professor in the MFA Creative Writing Program at the University of Minnesota. He received a Lifetime Achievement Award in Literature from the Border Regional Library Association in 2003.
